# 1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

---

Following complaints received by the Commission regarding the entrapment of young individuals on blasphemy charges from alleged pornographic and blasphemous websites, the National Commission for Human Rights (NCHR), in its statutory capacity under Section 9(c) of the National Commission for Human Rights Act 2012, initiated an independent inquiry into the matter in October 2023. The inquiry aimed to verify the authenticity of these complaints, examine the reasons behind the sharp rise in blasphemy cases in Pakistan over the past three years, and ensure that due process had been observed.

Section 9(c) empowers the Commission “or any person authorized by it may visit any jail, place of detention or any other institution or place under the control of the Government or its agencies, where convicts, under trial prisoners, detainees or other persons are lodged or detained for purposes of ascertaining the legality of their detention as well as to find out whether the provisions of the applicable laws or other provisions relating to the inmates living conditions and their other rights are being complied with”.

Over the last one year the Commission has been following the issue closely. Methodology for the investigation included;

- Nationwide jail visits
- Interviewing hundreds of inmates incarcerated under alleged blasphemy charges
- Meeting families of accused
- Meetings with relevant government and law enforcement stakeholders
- Full bench Commission hearing with families of accused and government officials including from FIA, SP Branch, Ministry of human Rights etc:

The Commission was granted full access to all prisons housing individuals detained on alleged blasphemy charges. NCHR’s visits to major prisons nationwide and interviews with inmates incarcerated on such charges exposed systemic flaws and serious violations of fundamental rights, as well as disturbing patterns of entrapment and injustice.

The investigation’s findings highlighted a troubling trend: a sharp increase in registration of blasphemy cases, majority of whom were initiated by the Federal Investigation Agency's (FIA) Cybercrime unit, frequently in collaboration with a private entity. This rise in cases correlates to the operationalisation of the PECA Act Amendment of 2018. Young men were reportedly targeted through entrapment tactics involving female operatives using pseudonyms to lure



them into blasphemous activities online, resulting in their subsequent arrests. This pattern, which has escalated significantly over time, calls for a comprehensive review of the roles and accountability of both government and private entities involved in such cases.

In these cases, due process was notably disregarded, with significant procedural violations observed at multiple stages. Arrests were often carried out by private individuals rather than law enforcement, and there were disturbing reports of torture both during apprehension and immediately afterward. Detainees' written statements were frequently obtained under duress, compromising the legitimacy of their content. Legal aid and support for the accused were systematically obstructed and, in some instances, actively threatened. This was further substantiated by a lawyer who testified in an NCHR hearing that he had been ostracized by the legal community solely for accepting such cases.

Additionally, there was a pronounced lack of forensic examination of devices, which is essential in securing objective evidence in such cases. Fundamental procedural requirements under sections 156-A and 196 of the Criminal Procedure Code (CrPC) were repeatedly neglected, undermining the integrity of the investigative process. Moreover, the failure to complete challans in a timely manner resulted in extended legal uncertainty for the accused, raising serious concerns about the fairness and transparency of these proceedings.

Within the prison facilities, conditions were deplorable and fall far below the minimum standards established by international human rights frameworks, including the United Nations Standard Minimum Rules for the Treatment of Prisoners (the Nelson Mandela Rules). According to prison officials, individuals accused of blasphemy are housed together in single, severely overcrowded barracks to protect them from potential harm by other inmates who may attack or threaten them. However, this arrangement results in inhumane living conditions, as the barracks lack adequate facilities and are grossly overcrowded.

Additionally, the detainees face coercion, extortion, and pressure from the private actors involved in their entrapment, who sometimes encourage them to engage in further criminal activities within the prison.

Severe breaches of privacy further exacerbate the prisoners already dire circumstances, creating an environment that not only violates fundamental human rights but also raises significant concerns about due process and the integrity of the legal system. These conditions highlight an urgent need for prison reforms in alignment with international human rights standards, to ensure detainees' safety and dignity, while upholding a fair and transparent judicial process for prisoners held under such blasphemy charges.

In examining the rise in blasphemy cases linked to entrapment via pornographic sites, it is essential to recognize the factors that may push youth toward pornography addiction. At the core is a glaring lack of comprehensive education on healthy relationships, self-esteem, and media literacy. This educational gap leaves youth uninformed about navigating respectful interactions.

Compounding the issue, digital literacy is rarely addressed in schools, leaving youth vulnerable to the pitfalls of irresponsible internet use and overexposure to explicit content. Mental health services, which could offer support for addictive behaviours, are limited, as are public awareness campaigns that de-stigmatize and educate about pornography addiction. Without such resources, young people face the burden of these challenges largely unsupported, and social stigmas prevent open discussion.

A lack of constructive activities compounds these issues; limited access to sports and extracurricular activities restricts healthy outlets for energy, stress relief, and social connection. Physical activity, especially team sports, can play a transformative role by releasing endorphins, building confidence, and reducing anxiety—key emotional triggers for addiction.

Additionally, the huge void in mental health support is concerning. Approximately 34% of Pakistani adolescents struggle with significant mental health issues like depression and anxiety, often linked to academic stress, family conflicts, and exposure to violence or abuse.

In this context, young people may turn to pornography as an escape, underscoring the urgent need for proactive mental health support and open, informed discussions to address the root causes of this issue<sup>1</sup>.

Throughout the past year, NCHR has repeatedly raised the urgent issue of youth entrapment in blasphemy cases with key government stakeholders. Deeply troubled, NCHR has voiced grave concerns over a government agency's role in working with a private entity to incarcerate people in cases lacking thorough investigation and due process, yet carrying the harrowing weight of a potential death sentence. Despite ongoing appeals and a year of engagement, we have yet to see substantial action from the government on this critical matter involving nearly 800 young citizens.

This disturbing pattern highlights an urgent need for transparent investigations and fair legal procedures, leading NCHR to make its findings public.

NCHR has made detailed recommendations in the report, which are summarized below:

1. Engage the highest levels of government and judiciary to address concerns regarding a government entity's involvement with private individuals in apprehending youth.
2. Constitute a Joint Investigation Team (JIT) through the Ministry of Human Rights, comprising officials from Special Branch, Intelligence Bureau, Ministries of Law, Interior, FIA, and other relevant departments.
3. Take immediate action, with PTA's involvement, to address blasphemous content and fake accounts, particularly on Facebook.
4. Scrutinize FIA's procedures when applying Pakistan Penal Code sections in arrests related to blasphemy.
5. Investigate FIA's leniency toward private entities and individuals involved in these cases, with disciplinary action for officials engaging in misconduct.
6. Ensure thorough and transparent FIA investigations, including forensic analysis of confiscated devices and questioning of parties involved, especially when arrests occur at private locations arranged by instigators.
7. Ensure that investigations under PPC section 295-C are conducted by officials of the required senior rank.
8. Investigate private entities allegedly luring youth into blasphemy charges, focusing on preventive education and awareness rather than entrapment.

9. Address issues of multiple FIRs filed by the same individuals across different regions, including the use of fake IDs to trap individuals through illicit content.
10. Involve the Ministry of Information in public awareness campaigns to advise youth on responsible digital behavior.
11. Consider implementing comprehensive, education covering relationships, respect and media awareness.
12. Promote digital literacy in schools to teach responsible internet use and media awareness.
13. Increase access to mental health support for youth dealing with addiction, providing them with healthier coping mechanisms.
14. Launch public campaigns to discuss addictions and promote healthy alternatives.
15. Provide youth with positive outlets like sports, arts, and clubs to redirect focus and foster healthy habits.

## 2. INTRODUCTION

---

Human rights, characterized as "fundamental rights" within the constitutional framework of Pakistan, are explicitly outlined in Articles 8 to 28 of the Constitution of 1973. These rights encompass a spectrum of essential entitlements such as the security of person (Article 9), safeguards concerning arrest and detention (Article 10), the right to a fair trial (Article 10A), inviolability of the dignity of man (Article 14), freedom of speech (Article 19), the right to information (Article 19A), freedom to profess religion and manage religious institutions (Article 20), equality of citizens (Article 25), non-discrimination in accessing public places (Article 26), and safeguards against discrimination (Article 27).

Of particular significance is the right to a fair trial, a pivotal addition introduced through the 18th Amendment to the Constitution in 2010. The Superior Judiciary underscores the paramount importance of due process in the administration of justice, emphasizing that since the incorporation of Article 10-A, the principles of a fair trial and due process have gained even greater prominence.

Sections 295 to 298-C of the Pakistan Penal Code encompass a range of offenses categorized as infringements against religious principles. Penalties for these violations vary from fines to substantial periods of imprisonment. Notably, Section 295-C mandates a mandatory death sentence for the defamation of the Prophet Muhammad (PBUH).

To date, in Pakistan there have been thousands of cases of blasphemy registered with 89 persons murdered- primarily through mob and individual action. Four murders, Sargodha, Swat, Quetta and recently Mirpurkhas have happened this year (2024) alone.

The majority of these offenses are designated as "non-bailable" according to Pakistani law, implying that the grant of bail hinges on the court's discretion and is not an automatic entitlement. Furthermore, these offenses are termed "cognizable," providing the police with the authority to launch investigations and apprehend suspected offenders without the requirement of a warrant. This legal framework holds profound implications for individuals accused of such offenses, as the gravity of penalties and the discretionary approach to bail emphasize the intricate balance between protecting religious sentiments and upholding individual rights within Pakistan's legal framework.

The FIA exercises jurisdiction in matters related to cybercrimes under the Prevention of Electronic Crimes Act (PECA) laws. PECA, enacted to address offenses in the realm of

electronic communication and digital information, empowers the FIA to investigate and prosecute cybercrimes in Pakistan. PECA outlines various offenses, including unauthorized access to information systems, electronic fraud, and the dissemination of hate speech or harmful content online. The FIA's jurisdiction under PECA allows it to investigate, track, and take legal action against individuals or entities involved in cybercrimes. This legislative framework reflects the government's commitment to addressing the challenges posed by technological advancements and ensuring the security of digital spaces.

The Cyber Crimes wing of the FIA has apprehended individuals involved in blasphemy under Section 11 of PECA that addresses hate crimes. Sec 11 states "Hate speech — Whoever prepares or disseminates information, through any information system or device, that advances or is likely to advance interfaith, sectarian or racial hatred, shall be punished with imprisonment for a term which may extend to seven years or with fine or with both". This is read with Section 28 of PECA which allows FIA to take cognisance of crimes under Sec 295 A of the PPC.

FIA oversees 15 Cyber Crime units across the country, each equipped with Anti-Blasphemy Cells that respond promptly to incoming reports. Using advanced Cyber Crime technology, these units track down individuals engaged in offensive activities on social media, sharing derogatory content on websites, or utilizing VPNs. Upon identification, these individuals are arrested and subjected to legal actions in accordance with the applicable laws.

NCHR team met the FIA on 14th December, 2023, and posed the following questions to the Agency;

1. Procedure for registration of a complaint and subsequent verification, inquiry and FIR registration
2. Time undertaken in verification and inquiry procedure with regard to the requirements of 05/2020 SOP of the FIA
3. Does FIA carry out forensics of the phone of accused?
4. Is it true that certain private individuals move most of the complaints?
5. Whether any inquiry has been made against the persons/women who share the blasphemous material?
6. Whether it is true that the same 4 or 5 women share the objectionable material and honey trap the youth?
7. Whether FIA complies with Section 156 A of CRPC under which the investigation of blasphemy has to be undertaken by a senior official?
8. Whether FIA complies with Sec 196 of CRPC that mandates permission from Federal or Provincial government for registration of a case under Sec 295 A of the PPC?

### 3. NCHR INTERVIEWS PRISONERS DETAINED FOR BLASPHEMY

---

In October and November 2023, the NCHR team conducted numerous visits to jails in various cities, engaging with prisoners detained under blasphemy laws. These visits unveiled alarming patterns and issues prevalent in the cases of individuals accused of blasphemy. The primary focus of these visits were the major prisons in ICT, Punjab, and Sindh provinces where the largest number of persons accused for blasphemy are housed. List of accused, from October 2023, are at Annexure A.

#### Central Jail, Adiala Rawalpindi

A visit by an NCHR team to Central Jail, Adiala Rawalpindi, on October 26, 2023, yielded important insights into the cases of prisoners detained under blasphemy laws. The overwhelming majority of the blasphemy cases involved FIA Cybercrime. Most of the prisoners fell within the age range of 20-30, and were mainly Muslims.

NCHR discovered that a private entity initiated almost all of the FIA cases, with individuals from that private entity serving as complainants. These same complainants, identified in the team's examination of 30 cases, were also found as complainants in different cases even across different provinces throughout the country.

During the visit, NCHR explored the inmates' living conditions and interviewed prisoners, revealing consistent narratives.

Concerns were raised about the inmate's mode of arrest and evidence collection process, where the accused claimed that screenshots provided by the complainants were considered sufficient, without investigating the background of the correspondence and a proper forensic analysis of the mobile phone in which the blasphemous material was allegedly found. Accused individuals asserted that the evidence was either planted or based on screenshots found on their phones. Additionally, the FIA did not take into consideration the context of the communication between the two parties- one of whom was the female entrapper.

Allegations of custodial torture surfaced, with claims that private individuals pressured the FIA to file FIRs. The team also uncovered a pattern where individuals, often contacted by females using pseudonyms, were entrapped, lured into blasphemous groups, and enticed to forward blasphemous material, following which they were subsequently apprehended.

Disturbingly, the NCHR team found that the families of the accused were often pressured to sever ties with them. Additionally, there were allegations of financial extortion while personal information and pictures of the detainees were shared on social media, violating their privacy.

Since prisoners held on blasphemy charges face security threats from other inmates they are housed together in single quarters. Living conditions in the prison were deplorable, with multiple men cramped into tiny rooms, lacking proper bedding. Medical screening upon arrest was absent, raising concerns about potential disease outbreaks

Financial limitations hindered many accused individuals from accessing legal counsel. Furthermore, many lawyers hesitated from taking up cases of blasphemy due to their own security concerns. Furthermore, shocking claims were made that private individuals offered certain detainees' freedom in exchange for engaging in sectarian violence and criminal activities while in prison.

One particularly poignant case involved a blind individual detained without legal representation, illustrating the complexities and challenges faced by those accused under blasphemy laws. The detainees hailed from various provinces, underscoring the widespread impact of this disturbing trend.

*Ahmad\* is a young man who, just five months before his arrest, had been declared legally blind. This being the final blow in a battle with deteriorating vision that left him entirely without sight. Yet, despite this profound disability, Ahmad presented himself voluntarily to the FIA when they summoned him to answer to the accusations against him.*

*When Ahmad couldn't fulfill their demands, he says the interrogators turned to physical coercion, striking him to compel him to surrender his phone—a phone he didn't have in his possession. A phone was later introduced as “evidence” in his case: a damaged device incapable of any viable forensic analysis.*

*For Ahmad, whose world had already gone dark, this ordeal stripped him of what little he had left—his dignity and his trust in a system meant to protect him. Ahmad's experience reminds us of the real lives affected by such missteps in the name of justice.*

*Examining such cases in detail can shed light on the broader issues within the legal framework, emphasizing the need for a thorough and just investigative process. It underscores the complexities that individuals with disabilities may encounter when navigating the legal system, especially in the context of sensitive and high-stakes cases like blasphemy with severe punishments.*

## District Jail Lahore

Out of a total accused held under blasphemy law, a significant number were arrested by the FIA under cyber-crime charges. The majority of the prisoners were aged between 21 and 33, reflecting a relatively youthful demography.

The religious breakdown revealed that there were 5 prisoners from the Ahmadiyya community, 4 from the Christian community, while the rest were Muslims. As in Rawalpindi, disturbingly, the jail was severely overcrowded, with a population of 6298, exceeding the sanctioned accommodation for 2000 prisoners. The conditions for those accused under blasphemy laws were deplorable, with 11-12 men crammed into cells measuring 6x12ft. Despite these challenging circumstances, the inmates expressed satisfaction with the medical and psychological care provided, as well as the treatment by prison authorities.

For their safety, the accused were kept separate from the general prison population. NCHR team visited the barracks, finding that the majority of inmates repeated narratives of entrapment similar to those observed in cases of blasphemy at Adiala Jail in Rawalpindi

There appeared to be a pattern and trend linking the Lahore and Islamabad networks, with individuals using the same female pseudonyms. The accused consistently reported a similar modus operandi involving contact by a girl, often from a Spanish number or a fake Facebook ID, leading to entrapment in a honey trap. They were added to blasphemous and pornographic Facebook or WhatsApp groups, from where they were asked to reshare objectionable content.

Following the sharing of such material, the accused were lured under false pretenses, including promises of job offers, business opportunities, immigration, or relationships to public places, restaurants etc. from where they were caught- most often by a group of private individuals. Initial arrests were conducted by private individuals, in private cars, leading to private premises where the accused reported severe torture, including physical abuse, recording of videos, and electric shocks. The accused alleged being pressured into signing blank papers that could later be manipulated. Following this initial process of entrapment and abuse, the accused were then allegedly handed over to the FIA.

The people involved in the 'arrests' were well connected and influential and were reported to pressurize lawyers, attend hearings to influence judges, and coerce families to sever contact with the accused.

Accused individuals claimed that proper forensic examinations of their phones were not conducted, which could exonerate them. Additionally, they informed that it is possible to add persons to Facebook groups without informing them.

Arrests were made in various cities, with some detainees reporting being picked up or called from Peshawar, Islamabad, and Faisalabad. In most cases, the police report (Challan) had not been submitted at the time of the NCHR visit.

As per the accused statements, investigations were not conducted at the Director level, violating Section 156-A of the Code of Criminal Procedure (CrPC), which requires complaints under Section 295-C to be investigated by an officer of at least the rank of Superintendent.

Notably, most of the accused individuals were from low socio-economic backgrounds with limited education. Many claimed to be unaware of the PECA and Cybercrime laws. Financial limitations hindered many accused individuals from accessing proper legal counsel

*Shaista\*, a mother fighting alone, shares the nightmare that has engulfed her family and her son, Uzair\*. Uzair, once a hopeful MBA student at an Islamic university, was preparing for his final exams when everything changed. He joined a Facebook group for buying and selling items, where he met a girl named "Imaan."*

*Imaan reached out, seeming friendly and understanding. Uzair confided in her about his struggles to find a job. Imaan promised him an opportunity, claiming she worked for the FIA, and convinced him to meet her. Over the next few months, she built his trust. When Uzair finally went to meet her at Centaurus, carrying his documents, he wasn't welcomed with a job. He was ambushed, kidnapped, beaten, and delivered straight to the FIA under accusations of blasphemy.*

*Shaista has shouldered this horror alone, her husband working miles away in Balochistan.*

*She struggles to care for her three children as this nightmare drains her physically and emotionally. Already fighting illness, she feels stretched to her breaking point, unable to comfort her younger children or reassure them that their brother will come home.*

*The family, desperate for Uzair's release, poured their savings into expensive lawyers, hoping for justice, but instead, they found themselves abandoned. His fiancée waits anxiously, her life also put on hold, while family and friends slowly disappear, fearful of the stigma and danger surrounding blasphemy accusations. Even Shaista's brother, a police officer, who initially stood by her, has since distanced himself upon learning of the charges, leaving the family to fend for themselves. The immense weight of this ordeal has left Shaista isolated and desperate, her pleas falling on silent ears in a society that now views her family with suspicion and fear. Her only hope is for her son's nightmare to end, for her family to be whole once more, but with each passing day, that hope feels more like a distant dream.*

## Central Jail Karachi

The NCHR team exclusively interviewed inmates detained by the FIA under Blasphemy charges in Central Jail Karachi. Several cases were highlighted, including eleven prisoners implicated under a single complaint FIR No. 13 of 2023, six were booked under FIR No. 205 of 2023, and three under FIR No. 43 of 2023. Interestingly, these individuals hailed from different areas and were unknown to each other before their arrests.

A chilling pattern runs through these arrests: the repeated involvement of the same 4–5 young women, using identical names and phone numbers to ensnare victims in honey traps. Their tactics are insidious, beginning with befriending young men on social media—most often on Facebook—and gradually luring them to explicit sites. Then, they would coax the men into sharing a specific, blasphemous image, which becomes the grounds for a blasphemy charge and subsequent arrest.

Following this the women would arrange a meeting in a public space, offering promises of marriage, immigration opportunities, financial aid, or expensive gifts. When the men would arrive at the designated location, they would be intercepted by plainclothes individuals and whisked away to undisclosed locations, where their phones would be seized as "evidence," and they would have to endure brutal interrogations and torture.

The age range of all individuals incarcerated is 17–33 years, with one exception of one case aged 45 years. Occupations vary, ranging from students to daily wagers, a dentist, an accountant, and a salesman, mostly belonging to lower financial backgrounds.

Allegations of torture, including third-degree methods such as electric shocks, were reported during arrest. Statements of accused persons were allegedly obtained by force, including signatures on blank papers. Some individuals couldn't afford legal representation, while others had private or government lawyers.

The primary network involved in the process appeared to be based in Lahore and is part of a larger alliance working against blasphemers in Pakistan. The network lured individuals to Lahore, offering money for travel, and if declined, alternate plans were made for meetings in Karachi/Sukkur etc. Girls enticed individuals with materials related to pornography and blasphemy, urging them to share it in various social media groups created by the network. Some individuals within the FIA seemed to be cooperating closely with the private entity, enabling it to operate with impunity.

---

*Madiha\* recounts the unraveling of her younger brother Bahram's\* life—a man once known for his brilliance and steady path as a civil engineer, consistently achieving top grades throughout his education. But a series of WhatsApp messages from a woman named "Imaan" shattered that promising future. Claiming to be recently returned from Spain, abandoned by her husband, and supposedly working "in high places," Imaan hounded Bahram, relentlessly pressuring him to send obscene content. Bahram tried to distance himself, but she persisted.*

*On June 2, 2023, an FIA team burst into their home at dawn, armed with a search warrant. They searched his phone, seized his electronic devices, and by 9:30 that morning, an FIR was filed against him. The family was left stunned, their lives upended in an instant, and were threatened into silence by officials who warned of "serious consequences" if they spoke out.*

*The ordeal has devastated Bahram's parents, who are now plagued by constant panic attacks. Every day is a struggle just to hold on. They have already sacrificed half of their life savings, and yet, every month, they must scrape together 70-80 thousand rupees to support Bahram in jail, paying for food and essentials. The family lives in terror, unable to attend mosques, unable to lead any semblance of a normal life, their days clouded by fear and shame.*

*Their community, once a source of connection, has turned its back on them. Once-respected family members now avoid them, unwilling to bear the stigma of blasphemy allegations. Their social standing has crumbled, leaving them isolated, stigmatized, and alone. Bahram, one of four siblings, remains in jail, while his family fights every day just to survive the overwhelming pressure and judgment cast upon them. The constant dread has left them drained and desperate, caught in a nightmare they never saw coming, with no end in sight.*

The comprehensive findings, based on data from NCHR's confidential report compiled in November 2023, reveal systemic issues and potential legal violations. Urgent action is required to investigate these allegations thoroughly and ensure accountability to uphold justice and safeguard individuals' rights.

## 4. UPDATE (25 July, 2024 )

NCHR also received additional complaints and requests from over 100 inmates from Camp Jail in Lahore and 100 inmates from Adiala Jail in Rawalpindi, all concerning their arrests on blasphemy charges. In response, NCHR conducted follow-up visits to the jails in June 2024 to meet with the prisoners.

Unfortunately, the number of prisoners charged with blasphemy had risen substantially from earlier NCHR visits in October and November 2023. The data reveals a stark, accelerating rise in blasphemy-related incarcerations over recent years, with numbers surging from just 11 cases in 2020 to 767 by mid-2024. This increase is particularly pronounced in Punjab, where cases jumped dramatically, totalling 594 as of July 2024. Comparatively, other provinces report far lower figures, with Sindh at 120 cases, Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP) at 64, and 2 reported in Balochistan. This trend indicates not only a nationwide escalation but also highlights Punjab as the epicentre of these charges, suggesting a need for focused examination of systemic and regional factors at play.

Report by the Special Branch of Punjab Police, titled "The Blasphemy Business", submitted along with a complaint, (complaints attached at **Annexure C**) supports NCHR's findings and highlights similar patterns of arrest and suggesting potential exploitation of blasphemy laws.

### Death in Custody

An NCHR inquiry into the death of Husnain Ali, an inmate at Central Jail Adiyala in Rawalpindi on blasphemy charges, uncovered evidence of alleged torture during his arrest and remand with FIA officials. Following a complaint on June 11, 2024, an NCHR team visited the jail, where inmates reported mistreatment by FIA officials that may have contributed to Ali's health issues. Jail officials noted no complaints from Ali during his detention but confirmed his admission to the hospital due to severe pain shortly before his death on June 9, 2024. NCHR recommended the FIA take action against those involved, as per The Torture and Custodial Death Act of 2022, and urged a broader investigation into the increase in blasphemy-related torture cases. The Commission called for a hearing to develop unbiased investigation strategies and to look into FIA processes. (Inquest report attached at **Annexure D**)

### Allegation of Torture

Prisoners reported that their applications against the FIA for torture were not thoroughly investigated. One prisoner, Naik Muhammad, son of Abdul Raheem, submitted a written complaint to the Commission seeking action against private individuals allegedly involved in his torture (attached copy). In response to this complaint, the NCHR team requested the available records from the jail authorities regarding the reported torture.

According to the jail records, Medical Officer reported that Naik Muhammad, aged 28, was admitted on December 20, 2023, with a documented history of police torture. His injuries were detailed as follows:

- A bluish-black bruise on the right buttock measuring 16 cm x 14 cm
- A bluish-black bruise on the left buttock measuring 10 cm x 12 cm
- A bruise on the right shoulder measuring 5 cm x 7 cm
- A bruise on the left shoulder measuring 5 cm x 13 cm

The jail authorities notified the Chief Police Officer (CPO) of Rawalpindi and the Deputy Director (FIA) of Rawalpindi Circle about these injuries in accordance with their procedure, via letter No. 57903-04 dated December 27, 2023. A copy of this communication was also submitted to the concerned Judicial Magistrate under Section 30. However, despite these notifications, no action has been taken thus far. (Intimation report attached at **Annexure E**)

NCHR has submitted its report to all relevant stakeholders and has held meetings to discuss the findings and the concerning trend of increasing blasphemy-related arrests. The increasing number of arrests under blasphemy charges is alarming. The similarity in the details of the arrests points towards potential manipulation or misuse of blasphemy laws by certain groups. There is a pressing need for impartial and thorough investigations into these cases to ensure justice and prevent the misuse of blasphemy laws. Continuous collaboration and dialogue among all stakeholders, including law enforcement agencies, human rights organizations, and the judiciary, are essential to address this issue effectively. NCHR and other investigative bodies also emphasize the urgency of addressing this disturbing trend to safeguard human rights and ensure the fair application of the law<sup>2</sup>.

Asghar\* was a miracle child, born after 17 years of his parents' prayers and hopeful waiting. His arrival brought them the happiness they had longed for in a lifetime together. Now, years later, as his elderly parents live out their final chapters, they find themselves in a place of unimaginable loss and desperation.

---

*When Asghar\* was arrested under the same entrapment scheme that ensnared so many others, his parents' lives were upended. They left their home in Jhelum, abandoning the community they'd known all their lives, to rent a small, house close to Adiala Jail. Their world has now shrunk to this rental space, held together by little more than their devotion to Asghar. Their beloved child, born after a wait of 17 years. In a community that has distanced itself from them, they are struggling alone, forced to live on their limited savings while they try to navigate a hostile and indifferent system.*

*The emotional and physical toll on these parents is profound. Once surrounded by family and friends, they now find themselves alienated and burdened by shame. They are advanced in age and exhausted by the constant worry and sorrow that their son, who was once their greatest blessing, may never come home. Their days are marked by court hearings, waiting outside prison gates, and scraping together money for legal fees and daily needs. Every effort, every penny, and every ounce of strength they have left is spent in the hope that Asghar might one day be free.*

## 5. HEARING WITH FAMILIES OF ACCUSED & GOVERNMENT STAKEHOLDERS

---

### July 30th 2024

NCHR received multiple complaints regarding blasphemy cases, as outlined in complaint number 2(177)24 on May 8, 2024. Signed by 88 petitioners, these complaints allege that "fake and motivated blasphemy cases" have been filed against over 250 educated young Muslims, with due process being ignored.

On July 30, 2024, NCHR held a full bench hearing, gathering government stakeholders and petitioners to discuss the situation. Testimonies revealed a consistent pattern of entrapment involving deceptive communications and arrests carried out by same private individuals. (Order sheet from the hearing attached at Annexure F).

Significantly, many accused individuals come from low socio-economic backgrounds, lacking knowledge of relevant laws and facing challenges in obtaining legal representation. The Special Branch representative expressed concerns over procedural flaws, while the Ministry of Human Rights noted the implications that this issue had for Pakistan in its upcoming treaty reviews.

In response to inquiries, the FIA Cybercrime representative asserted that they follow legal protocols and utilize quality forensic equipment but promised to provide further details. Given the alarming trends and potential misuse of blasphemy laws, the Commission recommends the establishment of a Joint Investigation Team (JIT) involving high-ranking officials from various government entities to ensure impartial investigations into these cases.

The Terms of Reference (TORs) for this committee may include the following:

1. Conduct an objective and impartial assessment into the reason behind the exponential rise in blasphemy cases ensuring that adherence to legal procedures has been upheld by investigating agencies.
2. Investigate the motives and actions of private entities involved in the entrapment and exploitation of individuals accused of blasphemy.
3. Probe into the alleged connivance of relevant government officials with private persons in handling blasphemy cases.
4. Develop and implement a media awareness campaign to sensitize the public about issues leading to blasphemy allegations.

5. Assess and recommend reforms, if necessary, to improve the procedures followed by the FIA in handling blasphemy cases.
6. Provide petitioners and families of accused with the opportunity to present their grievances and evidence before the JIT, ensuring fair and transparent proceedings.

---

*Usman Iqbal\*, an 18-year-old IT student, had his life and dreams disrupted only days after receiving his CNIC. Usman is the youngest of five siblings in a financially struggling household.*

*Usman received messages from a Facebook account allegedly operated by a young woman, who quickly drew him into a false sense of connection. The account's owner initially sent him explicit photos, persistently requesting he reciprocate. Soon, the individual arranged to meet with Usman. Unaware of the trap being laid, he agreed, hoping to meet a friend.*

*Upon arrival, Usman was surrounded and apprehended by a group of private individuals, with one FIA officer present. His mobile phone was confiscated, along with his social media account details, including his password. An FIR was filed against him, along with six other names of individuals he had never met or heard of before.*

*Usman's family has since been left devastated, struggling to support him both financially and emotionally as they grapple with the mounting legal fees and the stigma associated with his arrest. The emotional toll on his family has been profound, with Usman's dreams, education, and future seemingly slipping further out of reach each day.*

## 6. RECOMMENDATIONS

---

1. This matter needs to be brought up at the highest level of government and judiciary. It is of concern that a government entity is involved, with private individuals, in apprehending the country's youth.
2. A Joint Investigation Team (JIT) must be constituted by the Ministry of Human Rights immediately. The proposed JIT may include high-ranking officials from the following entities:
  - Special Branch
  - Intelligence Bureau
  - Ministry of Law and Justice
  - Ministry of Interior
  - FIA
  - Any other relevant departments.

The Terms of Reference (TORs) for this committee may include the following:

- Conduct an objective and impartial assessment into the reason behind the exponential rise in blasphemy cases ensuring that adherence to legal procedures has been upheld by investigating agencies.
  - Investigate the motives and actions of private entities involved in the entrapment and exploitation of individuals accused of blasphemy.
  - Probe into the alleged connivance of relevant government officials with private persons in handling blasphemy cases.
  - Develop and implement a media awareness campaign to sensitize the public about issues leading to blasphemy allegations.
  - Assess and recommend reforms, if necessary, to improve the procedures followed by the FIA in handling blasphemy cases.
  - Provide petitioners and families of accused with the opportunity to present their grievances and evidence before the JIT, ensuring fair and transparent proceedings.
3. Immediate action should be taken against the proliferation of blasphemous groups and fake IDs circulating on the internet, particularly on Facebook. The involvement of the Pakistan Telecommunication Authority (PTA) should be integral to this initiative.

4. The authority of the Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) to invoke sections of the Pakistan Penal Code (PPC) in arresting individuals requires careful scrutiny.
5. The reasons behind the apparent leniency of the FIA towards the private entities and individual complainants involved should be thoroughly examined. FIA officials engaging in illegal arrests or soliciting bribes may be subject to strict disciplinary proceedings.
6. There needs to be better investigation by FIA which includes forensic analysis of the mobile phones confiscated, cross examination/arrest of instigating party i.e. the women who trapped the accused. Furthermore, all victims alleged that they were arrested at a private location identified by the women and it was at these locations that FIA or a private party arrested them. This mode of operation renders questions on the impartiality of the FIRs registered.
7. Although the offence of 295-C under PPC requires investigation by a police officer not below the rank of an SP, however in the present cases, there is no evidence of FIA employing investigation by corresponding senior rank of officials.
8. A comprehensive investigation into the operations and agenda of involved private entities in entrapping youth is essential. Instead of focusing on education, awareness, and correction, there appears to be an organized network actively luring and inciting individuals to commit blasphemy for the purpose of apprehension.
9. The issue of multiple FIRs throughout the country being registered by same individuals also needs to be looked at, especially as an organized activity where fake IDs are being used to trap individuals using sexual content
10. Ministry of Information needs to be involved to generate public awareness, especially for young people to be careful in their activities in the digital domain.
11. Addressing youth addiction to pornography requires a multifaceted approach that includes education, mental health support, guidance, and policy initiatives. For some young people, watching pornography becomes a way to escape stress, anxiety, or other emotional challenges. Government may also consider to;
12. Implement age-appropriate, comprehensive education that covers topics like healthy relationships, self-esteem, and critical thinking about media and online content.
13. Promote digital literacy in school curriculums to teach young people about responsible internet use, the impacts of online behaviours, and media awareness.
14. Increase access to mental health services and counselling for young people dealing with addiction. Specialized therapists can help youth understand their habits, develop healthier coping mechanisms, and overcome dependency.

15. Launch public awareness campaigns to de-stigmatize conversations around addiction, educate the public on its impacts, and promote healthy approaches to addressing it.
16. Provide youth with alternative outlets and resources that promote positive self-expression, healthy social interactions, and education, such as online courses, sports, arts, and extracurricular clubs. Sports and extracurricular activities can be highly effective in helping youth address pornography addiction by redirecting their focus and fostering healthier habits. These activities provide constructive outlets for energy, stress relief, and social connection, which can reduce the urge to engage in addictive behaviours.

## 7. CONCLUSION

---

A full year has passed since NCHR began tracking this urgent issue, yet no meaningful action has been taken by the government to prevent the systematic entrapment and incarceration of hundreds of youths on blasphemy charges. Each FIR disrupts a life, and for those accused, every day in prison is fraught with fear—not only of unjust charges but of possible vigilante attacks from other prisoners who may see themselves as enforcers of extrajudicial punishment. These individuals face a grim reality where prolonged trials can take decades to conclude, leaving them in a perpetual state of vulnerability and despair.

The profound concerns over potential malice, extortion, and the troubling involvement of private individuals orchestrating arrests remain unaddressed. These young people deserve fair, transparent investigations and the constitutional right to a fair trial—a right that is slipping further out of reach as each day passes.

Respected Sir,

We write to you with the utmost respect to bring to your attention a matter of critical sensitivity involving blasphemy allegations against 250+ individuals by the Cyber Crime Wing of the Federal Investigation Agency (FIA) and the [REDACTED]. The accused individuals, totaling 250, are primarily young members of the nation hailing from educated and civilized backgrounds. Regrettably, they have been subjected to arrest, torture, and mistreatment by the FIA's Cyber Crime Wing under suspicion of committing blasphemy under Section 11 of the Prevention of Electronic Crimes Act 2016 (PECA), in conjunction with Sections 295A, 295B, 295C, 298A, and 109 of the Pakistan Penal Code (PPC). It is evident that these legal sections have been misused by the agency, as all the detained individuals are followers of Islam, adhere to its teachings, and are not involved in the alleged offenses.

All registered First Information Reports (FIRs) and associated cases share a uniform nature, comprising identical details. The alarming arrest of approximately 150 adults within a span of two months underscores the suspicious intent of the authorities involved, potentially manipulated by questionable individuals who have filed complaints against multiple individuals. It is noteworthy that a mere handful of complainants have targeted the 250+ detainees. It should be emphasized that the same visual evidence has been employed in various cases, attributing the same erroneous accusation of creation, development, and transmission to each individual.

Within organizations operating under the guise of blasphemy concerns, certain unscrupulous elements maintain ties with corrupt officers within the FIA's Cyber Crime Wing. This alliance exploits innocent citizens, ensnaring them in fabricated blasphemy cases to extort substantial sums of money. These groups and their agents disseminate offensive imagery overlaid with verses from the Holy Quran, Darood-e-Pak, and names of revered religious figures through platforms like WhatsApp groups and related forums. To further their nefarious agenda, these groups resort to hacking citizens' mobile devices or utilizing sophisticated computer applications and techniques to manipulate personal data and phone numbers.

Despite receiving numerous daily complaints from the public about severe crimes such as money laundering, electronic terrorism, digital vandalism, financial fraud, and electronic extortion by habitual fraudsters, the FIA's Cyber Crime Wing seems preoccupied with safeguarding the interests of these associated groups rather than eradicating such criminal activities. This negligence has left countless individuals across the country awaiting justice in these cybercrime cases.

A concerning aspect is the involvement of young women within these organizations, who entice highly educated, devout, and well-presented young individuals with promises of lucrative employment, romantic engagement, or attractive incentives. They then manipulate these individuals into sharing offensive content, only to subsequently file blasphemy cases against them through deceit and trickery. This network, involving both male and female representatives, files identical cases against unsuspecting victims after altering their personal details.

Certain elements within these organizations purporting to address blasphemy issues have also formed alliances with lawyers and religious scholars. These individuals are driven by the pursuit of power, financial gains, and influence over the masses. These sincere scholars, motivated by their faith, unknowingly support the cause of these groups in courts and other platforms. In return, these groups amass wealth and status within the community.

This disturbing network further collaborates with mentors and scholars from mosques, madrassahs, and other religious institutions, using their illicit earnings to sway them with good deeds and apparent religious service. Exposing their morally reprehensible business practices is crucial for the stability of Pakistan. Notably, two fellow Islamic countries, Malaysia and Bangladesh, have charted paths to prosperity by dismantling the monopolistic control of such unscrupulous religious elites.

It is evident that the ~~Legal Commission on Blasphemy (LCB)~~ manipulates FIA contract employees within its Cyber Crime Wing. These employees are exploited as tools, assured of regularization in exchange for aiding the commission's vigilante agenda by apprehending alleged blasphemers.

As the grieving parents of the 250 individuals accused of blasphemy charges, our confidence in the investigative processes conducted by the FIA's Cyber Crime Wing has been shattered due to the agency's compromised neutrality stemming from the influence of the ~~Legal Commission on Blasphemy (LCB)~~. The fact that the same FIA officials apprehend the accused, investigate complaints, and become witnesses presents a substantial impediment to the accused seeking justice. We therefore humbly beseech that the ongoing investigation be invalidated and recommenced under the vigilant oversight of relevant judicial authorities.

In light of these circumstances, your good self is requested to take notice of this and we implore your esteemed self to empathize with the predicament of these remorseful young individuals. Extending a measure of leniency and opportunity will not only preserve their lives but also

safeguard the dignity and honor of their immediate families. We earnestly request a chance for their rehabilitation, allowing them to become contributing and responsible members of our nation.

## Special Report

**THE BLASPHEMY BUSINESS - A SUSPICIOUS GANG IS TRAPPING YOUTH IN BLASPHEMY CASES & EXTORTING MONEY FROM THEM AFTER APPROACHING FEDERAL INVESTIGATION AGENCY (FIA) IN RAWALPINDI & ISLAMABAD**

1. The field staff of this agency reported that there is a gang of some suspicious persons, based in Rawalpindi/Islamabad who are trapping simple youth in blasphemy cases and referring their cases to FIA. Reportedly, this gang is the complainant in about ninety percent blasphemy cases reported to and registered by FIA. A number of men and women are part of this gang which is reportedly headed by **Shiraz Ahmad Farooqi (0300 5451899)** who poses as a worker of **Talib ul Madaris Pakistan (TMD)**. A lawyer, **Abdul Rehman Advocate**, is also part of this gang. They have formed an organization named **Legal Committee** and are normally operating under its banner.

**Modus Operandi**

2. The gang is operating in the following manner:

- a. They have formed different WhatsApp and Facebook groups on social media. Initially they lure and add youth in their groups. They then share critical, sensitive and controversial contents in these groups through the gang members. While chatting in groups, less qualified, not-so-aware of the sensitiveness of the contents, or simpleton youth pass some irresponsible comments and controversial remarks. The gang members, by trick, lure/ask that boy to send these remarks or comments to their personal numbers. These comments are saved and a case is prepared for FIA through connivance of some elements in the agency as well.
- b. Usually, the initiator of controversial remarks is called through some girl and negotiated for some settlement. Later on, in case of failure or non-agreement, his case is sent to FIA. Some of their social media groups are: **United Mazhabi Story, Laiba Mazhabi King, Azad Mazhabi Ilam** etc. The gang members are full time busy in such activities. Sources of their funding are not known. **Abdul Rehman Advocate**, one of the gang members, seems to be impressed by **Mamraz Qasbi** and was involved in kidnapping-cum-murder case of **Shahid Mahmood** in 2022 which later on ended in a compromise. They are working in an organized manner and they have set their targets to trap and implicate a large number of persons. They also publish and distribute leaflets in twin cities warning public against acts of blasphemy and arrange seminars over the issue.



- c. Reportedly, this gang has got 21 FIRs registered in FIA Cyber Crime Reporting Center, Rawalpindi since September 2022 and 10 of their complaints are in the process of inquiry.

#### Analysis

According to human rights groups, blasphemy laws in Pakistan have been exploited for persecuting minorities, and for settling personal rivalries - often against other Muslims and not as much for protecting religious sensibilities.

The current issue is very serious and critical. These miscreants and anti-social elements are trapping simple and innocent youth in concocted blasphemy cases, which is unlawful not only in Islam but also is a crime under prevailing law of the land. They are running their illegal network in the name of Islam. Prima facie they seem to be either working on some foreign agenda and/or blackmailing less qualified and simple youth for extortion. The situation requires thorough and exhaustive probe.

#### Recommendations

- i. FIA may be directed to launch a thorough probe to dig out discreet activities of the gang. Those found involved in illegal and anti-social activities may be proceeded against under relevant laws.
- ii. FIA may also conduct forensics of mobile phones of the complainants of blasphemy incidents committed on cyber space, to determine the actual source of the crime.

A team of three representative (2 male & 1 female) from NCHR visited Adiala Jail, Circle 4 (Special Pehra) on Oct 26, 2023 to meet under-trial prisoners about blasphemy cases. We all had been interviewed one by one in detail. We had explained each and everything about how we were trapped, ulterior motives of group of complainants namely [REDACTED], and corruption of FIA and their common interests with complainants, your team have noted everything with list of 120+ youngsters imprisoned in Adiala Jail. This number have been increased to 150+ now.

It is inquire you about update and aftermath of that meeting. it's been Six months to that meeting, we have been waiting for a help, NCHR is the only light of hope for us. We are all educated youth incarcerated for the accusation of blasphemy with death penalty. Our life, career, family, everything is on stake.

Respected Sir,

Thousands of people and hundreds of families seeking your help to get rid of the trap of people doing blasphemy business. poor and common Pakistanis are being trapped by professional groups. Most dangerous and unjust role of the FIA has tightened people and put them in such a situation from where no one can expect justice due to the complexity of our legal system.

**About us:**

We belong to a poor and well practicing Muslim family. All our family members put their best efforts to perform religious rituals. We offer prayers, recite the Holy Quran and celebrate all religious days in the utmost sacred way.

Being Muslim, our whole family love Nabi e Karim Hazrat Muhammad Mustafa (ﷺ), "Sahaba-e-Karam" and "Ahl-e-Bait-e-Athar" from the bottom of our heart just like as all other Muslims do. We never disobeyed any national or religious law. We are law-abiding people. We are gentle people and earn halal sustenance through hard work and honesty.

**Issue's Background:**

This is a very difficult time for poor Pakistani Muslims. Many traps are set around to trap victims of poverty, ignorance, illiteracy, inflation, deprivations, sexual excitement.

Financial and sexual temptations are given to deprive people from true religious teaching and practices by nudity on social platforms i.e. Facebook, YouTube and WhatsApp.

When people get stuck in nudity, then they are systematically driven towards blasphemous content. Misguided, deprived and sexually sick people without understanding the trap do what they even can't think to do knowingly. They don't know the consequences of such activities.

Then, the next phase of this trap is started. People are added in Facebook and WhatsApp groups where inappropriate and blasphemous content is shared and People too are dragged to do so through different kinds of temptations.

Once people get trapped, screenshots of their Facebook accounts and WhatsApp are taken. People are threatened, beaten and FIRs are filed against them.

There is no role of law enforcement agencies is observed till the FIR is filled. However, they say that they were observing this all for months.

Out of these victims three young prisoners Safeerullah, Fatima Jahangir and Syed Hasnain Raza have died in Lahore in Camp Jail, Kot Lakhpat Jail and Adyala jail respectively. The latest death of Hasnain Raza has been occurred in Adyala Jail in June, 2024 and torture marks have been found on his body during last bath.

Dear Sir, the life of our beloved is at stake in jail and even outside of jail too due to incorrect registration of FIRs against prisoners.

**Points to be noted:**

- Muslims can be the sinner or the wrongdoer, but cannot be blasphemers or Insolent. However, if they have committed something wrong, they should not be considered as blasphemers because it cannot be their fully aware action. If they are asked what they did, surely they will be shamed and seek forgiveness from Allah Almighty. They should not be convicted, but they should be treated with Islamic teachings so that their soul and weak faith can be cured. Allah loves to forgive and likes who forgive.
- There is no role of law enforcement agencies is observed till the FIR is filled. However, they say that they were observing this all for months. State should be proactive and take primitive measures before it happens. So that people can be protected from such crimes.
- Law enforcement agencies are just doing "copy & pest" all legal provisions of PECA and PPC both in all cases without determining and ascertaining the role of an accused. Although, they know very well that these causes are required to be handled with great care and responsibility.
- Many people are gathered or grouped in a single FIR, even though these people are unknown to each other. This practice complicates their cases and decisions on such cases get delayed month after month. If FIR is required to be filed, each individual must be fixed in a single FIR so that his or her case can be judged independently.
- There are very few petitioners in all FIRs. These petitioners are always found there where such wrongdoing is being committed, but these remain innocent in all cases.
- Cases are frequently being transferred from one judge to another. A judge starts to understand the actual case, and the case is transferred to another one. It is causing delay in justice.

More than 220 people, who belong to practicing Muslim families, are in Camp Jail Lahore and there are many more around Pakistan. They are scared and their families are too. You know better than us, how this situation is terrifying in our society and what kind of consequences can be faced. Following is a list of such cases for your kind attention, may be it is helpful for understanding the case:

[REDACTED] is married and has 03 kids, [REDACTED] (12 Years old), [REDACTED] (9 Years Old) and a daughter [REDACTED] (8 Years old). [REDACTED] earns livelihood for his family through labor as he is a Matric passed person. Although he was worried due to inflation and less earning, he was managing his expenses. His kids are studying in NGO based schools. He and his wife dreamed that their children would earn a better livelihood and live their lives better after being educated.

Respected Sir,

He was also trapped in the same scenario as mentioned earlier. He was tempted through WhatsApp messages and calls. He was guided towards Facebook from where he was added in a so-called religious WhatsApp group.

My son has been in Camp Jail Lahore since 30th September 2023. Since then, our whole family is getting tortured every day. The cry of his old mother, wife and children is very painful. I, myself, am 80 years old and old bones cannot allow me to earn bread and butter for Faisal's kids.

Sir, you are a ray of hope for us in these hard times. We are looking for your personal attention on this issue. Please get my son and all of us from this painful situation.

Please order to release [REDACTED] and all other people who are the sinner but not blasphemers or insolent. [REDACTED] is ashamed of himself being accused of such a shameful act. He is seeking forgiveness from Allah Almighty and the Law as well. My whole family is seeking forgiveness from Allah Almighty and the Law too. Allah loves to forgive and likes who forgive.

Sir, [REDACTED] and all of us are assuring you that we will not use any social media for the rest of our lives. Sir, I have also attached my handwritten request with this application for seeking help from your good office. Please help us. Please pass an order to your lower courts to release my son. As Salaam-O-Alaikum / Hello,

Respected Sir / Madam,

I am **Shams-ur-Rehman** (Father), I am writing a request to you, please save my son and help me as much as u can in saving him. My son name is **Saqib Shams**, 23y, Muslim, bachelor's degree holder. In June 2023 my son got some messages and calls from a girl continuous 8 to 10 days, when he asked her that from where you found my WhatsApp number, she replied I find it randomly and I (she) live in Rawalpindi and then she started requesting him to help her in finding some job as she belongs to poor family. She asked **Saqib** what is he doing, so he told her that I am teaching + studying in Canada affiliated academy "STEM Wizards Academia" located in "Abbottabad, Pakistan", she said I also want job there so I will also apply in STEM Wizards Academia, Then no contact for few days. After few days she sent my son some blasphemous pictures (**Saqib**), **Saqib** ashamed her and confronted her, in reply she said "I did not send anything, maybe somebody in my house or academy took my phone and sent, show me what is sent to you from my side", so **Saqib** sent her back the blasphemous pictures which she sent earlier, right after that she blocked him. Next day FIA (Islamabad Center) came to Academia on 22.6.2023 and arrested **Saqib** from "STEM Wizards Academia", where he was working at that time, and threatened the staff there NOT to inform his family and father about it that we have arrested him.

As we live in Lahore, Pakistan, and **Saqib** was in Abbottabad for study, they took him to Rawalpindi FIA center, and informed Me that we have made FIR against **Saqib** but when I went there, they have given me FIR copy which is not in name of **Saqib Shams** but in name of **Abul Hasan Ali Nadwi** (Dated 12-06-2023), FIA Deputy Director Cyber Crime **Abul Hasan Ali Nadwi** told me that FIR is not directly made in **Saqib**'s name.

when **Saqib** asked why You arrested me, they showed him that WhatsApp chat, **Saqib** claimed to see his side that why he sent and what was the reason and told about girl also, but they said whatever you are saying is a lie and now you will be charged as Toheen.e. Rasalat (involved in blasphemy act). When **Saqib** refused to admit, they threatened him and took him to Islamabad FIA center, tortured him a lot, with electric shock, Big Rubber pipes, wooden sticks (All Naked), and said If you will not agree, we have notified your father also about it and he is coming, we will torture your father also, and we will arrest each family member of yours, including MOTHER and we will torture them as we are doing with you, **Saqib** agreed because of fear and torture, Plus **Saqib**'s phone was with FIA now, they showed him that we have made lots of I.Ds on social media of you and added blasphemous pictures and videos, using your phone number, so now we have proofs also, they took **Saqib**'s signatures on papers forcefully and made a video of him accepting the crime that he did blasphemous acts on social media. FIA claimed that you will say to your father and We will mention in our documentation also that you were involved in these blasphemous acts in sharing your own pictures and videos plus watching others and joined several groups by the I.Ds (made By the **Abul Hasan Ali Nadwi** gang who trapped my son), and that GIRL is completely out of the picture now in whole scene.



FIA Islamabad arrested [REDACTED] on 22.6.2023 (Thursday), FIR is not directly in [REDACTED] name but jailed under acts:

\_295 A,B,C \_109 PPC \_298 A By which they have confined us from getting bail through Court .

FIA Islamabad Center took 3 days remand for him. In these 3 days they brought so many boys there, tortured them and claimed same allegations to them also and they all agreed because of FIA's Deputy Director Cyber Crime reporter [REDACTED] threats and tortures and with him some Clerics also come in civil cloths and beat the victims. If any victim tries to hire a lawyer for them, these people (Clerics + Prosecutor/ plaintiff [REDACTED]) are not letting it happen by threatening the lawyers and judges.

They shifted [REDACTED] to Adiala Jail, Rawalpindi on 26.6.2023. Now in Jails, 400+ innocent people are trapped under same allegations of blasphemy (same case) are trapped across the Pakistan. For some victims, FIRs are on their name directly and for some it is not. Most of the boys are Bachelors, Masters and PHD holders.

Respected Sir/ Madam, you can send your concerned person to Adiala Jail Rawalpindi, Pakistan for counter checking all this matter. For all these 400+ innocent victims mainly one prosecutor is present which is [REDACTED] For Islamabad FIA Court and other than him only 4 5 lawyers are working as prosecutors who are already in his team. [REDACTED] is the chairman of [REDACTED] and his gang 35 to 40 people are present who are the plaintiffs in these cases, one plaintiff involved in FIRs of several victims. [REDACTED] is sharing names of victims on his pages of Facebook and tweeter, his page name is [REDACTED] [REDACTED] this should be confidential. [REDACTED] is the private lawyer of State as Cases are Victim's Vs State. Screenshots should not be considered as proofs because screenshots can be made as this is the era of photoshop and editing plus hacking. FIA presenting Same pictures + videos as proofs in all cases like copy paste, almost 60+ cases in Islamabad FIA and 30+ in Rawalpindi FIA with same pictures. And now they started sharing the pictures of parents who are fighting for their children to pressurize them and made there life in danger.

They are trapping innocent people and playing with their future and lives, by making fallacious allegations and fallacious proofs against innocent people, doing injustice. Mostly lawyers are not taking the case and judges are cancelling the bails and giving death sentences in trials due to the pressure of [REDACTED] Gang. Even they are trapping more and more innocent boys on daily bases under same allegations.

[REDACTED] is a highly talented boy, remained topper in school, college and University also, remained Class representative during his whole study duration till bachelors, also Working For an NGO "Alif Foundation" as "Active Member". He prays 5 times a day, fasts all 30 days of Ramadan, Gives zakat and funds in his NGO. He is so kind and innocent by heart, and keen to learn more about deen and dunia, throughout his 23 years of age he never ever involved in any wrong activity, no cigarettes, no drugs, no bad friends.

I really want to draw your attention towards this critical issue where approximately more than 400 of young graduates are suffering from injustice and imprisoned. All are looking towards you for helping and assisting in deliverance. So kindly Help Us, we have hope from YOU After Almighty Allah. We'll be so thankful to You for this act of kindness towards Us.

**INQUEST REPORT REGARDING THE DEATH OF UNDER TRIAL PRISONER NAMELY SYED ALI HUSNAIN S/O SOHAIL RAZA, INVOLVED IN CASE FIR NO.63 DATED 17.04.2024 U/S 295/A, B, C/298/109, 11 PECA, P.S. FIA RAWALPINDI, EXPIRED AT DISTRICT HEAD QUARTERS HOSPITAL, RAWALPINDI ON 09.06.2024.**

A letter having No.24304 dated 09.06.2024 was received from the office of Superintendent Central Jail, Rawalpindi with the request to hold inquest into the death of above named under trial prisoner, who was died on the way towards District Head Quarter Hospital, Rawalpindi on 09.06.2024. The under trial prisoner was confined in the Jail, in above mentioned case FIR as under trial prisoner.

2. I left for the DHQ hospital, Rawalpindi at about 01:10 AM on 10.06.2024 after receiving the letter, where Assistant Superintendent Jail Sajjad Haider Shah was already present. The accused was declared to be received as dead in District Head Quarter Hospital, Rawalpindi on 09.06.2024. The dead body of the deceased prisoner was lying in the mortuary of DHQ hospital, Rawalpindi, where, I personally examined the dead body of the deceased in the presence of Dr. Muhammad Hamza MO DHQ, Sajjad Haider Shah (Assistant Superintendent jail) and Nazar Hayat (ASI/I.O.). No legal heir of deceased was present in hospital at that time because as per information of Assistant Superintendent Jail and Nazar Hayat (ASI/I.O.) legal heirs of deceased are resident of Faisalabad who will reached after 05 to 06 hours. On physical examination of the dead body, bruise and swelling was found on left thigh with swollen tacticals. I.O. was directed to record statements of legal heirs of the deceased as and when they reached in DHQ Hospital Rawalpindi.

3. The statement of Ume-Kalsoom wife of Syed Sohail Raza (mother of deceased) alongwith Nida Bibi D/o Sohail Raza (Sister of deceased) was recorded by I.O. upon their arrival at DHQ Rawalpindi.

4. I also took statement of Dr. Nouman-Ul-Haq Medical Officer, Central Jail Hospital, Rawalpindi, according to which deceased was admitted in Jail, hospital on 09.06.2024 with history




of Urine retention alongwith lower abdominal pain and testicular pain with swelling. He was given injectable treatment, on 09.06.2024 he suddenly developed un-consciousness so, he was referred DHQ Hospital Rawalpindi on emergency basis. Call was received from police guard by the control room of jail that under trial prisoner has been expired on 09.06.2024. I also took statement of dispenser Muhammad Azhar Anjum of Central Jail, Rawalpindi

5. Investigation Officer Nazar Hayat ASI, P.S. Saddar Berooni, Rawalpindi, moved an application for seeking permission of postmortem examination of the deceased and handing over his dead body to the legal heirs. The said application was allowed and I.O. was directed to hand over the dead body of the deceased prisoner to the legal heirs after postmortem examination and fulfilling of all the legal formalities without any delay.

6. The Investigating Officer provided copies of postmortem examination report whereas, prescription of the deceased and death information proforma has been obtained from the jail. As per available record and postmortem report, the death of the deceased prisoner was natural due to illness. However, the final opinion will be given after receiving the report of PFSA. The interim inquest report is submitted for your kind perusal and action as per law.



In response to these allegations, NCHR conducted a series of nationwide visits to various jails of Pakistan to corroborate the data provided by the complainants and gather firsthand information on the matter. During its visits, the Commission uncovered alarming patterns of entrapment and injustice which revealed systemic flaws and violations of fundamental rights.</p> <p>3. The findings pointed to a troubling trend wherein the majority of blasphemy cases are apprehended by the Federal Investigation Agency's (FIA) Cybercrime unit, often in collaboration with a private entity. Young boys are caught from objectionable sites through entrapment tactics which involve female individuals (using pseudonyms) to lure victims into blasphemous groups and activities online, sharing objectionable data which in turn leads to their subsequent arrest. (Reports of Prison visits attached as Annexure B)</p> <p>4. Conditions within the prison facilities are also deplorable, with severe overcrowding and inadequate facilities in the</p> |

barracks where the individuals accused of blasphemy are housed. This setup is intended to protect these prisoners from potential harm by other inmates but results in significant human rights violations. Detainees often face coercion, invasion of privacy and are even pressured to engage in criminal activities.

5. During probe, NCHR also received an application dated 11. 6. 2024 on the allegations of torture, degrading and inhuman treatment of accused persons while in FIA remand. The application highlighted the death of a blasphemy accused namely Husnain Ali aged 29-30 years in Adiala Jail Rawalpindi. Inquiry report by the Oversight Committee of the Commission highlighted that the prisoner was admitted to the jail on 20.12.2023 with marks of torture which were reported by the jail authorities to CPO Rawalpindi and Deputy Director FIA. Copy of the said information was also submitted by the jail authorities to the concerned Judicial magistrate under Sec 30 (Inquiry report of Oversight Committee is at Annexure C)
6. Additionally, NCHR also came across reports from IB and Special Branch which corroborated the findings of the Commission. Despite these being internal documents, the SB Report entitled The Blasphemy Business has now become public with a report filed by a UK journalist Mr. Noorani.
7. In light of the above developments and the onslaught of umpteen emails received from families of accused, the Commission, exercising its statutory powers under Sec9 (a) and (i), held a hearing in presence of all Members of NCHR on the matter today i.e July 30<sup>th</sup>, 2024, calling key government stakeholders and few complainants for a comprehensive discussion on the issues raised, allowing both parties to present their perspectives and evidence. The hearing was attended by several petitioners, and representatives from the Ministry of Human Rights, Special Branch Punjab Police and the FIA. (List of attendees is at Annexure D).
8. At the onset, the petitioners were asked to highlight their issues and concerns.
9. The Petitioners were accompanied by their lawyer. A representative of the petitioners, whose brother is incarcerated under blasphemy charges, spoke on behalf of the other 88 petitioners- several of whom were present at

the commission. She also submitted a detailed presentation to the Commission.

10. The petitioner's testimony reflected the experiences of 88 individuals accused of blasphemy. All these individuals reported a similar pattern of events involving entrapment of their family members. Contact was initiated by a girl using a pseudonym, often through a Spanish phone number or a fake Facebook ID. The accused were subsequently added to blasphemous and pornographic Facebook or WhatsApp groups and were then requested to re-share objectionable content.
11. Following these interactions, the accused were lured under false pretenses, such as promises of job offers, business opportunities, immigration assistance, or romantic relationships. Arrests were made by private individuals using private vehicles and were conducted in various cities, including Peshawar, Islamabad, and Faisalabad. The accused were taken to private locations, where they reported experiencing severe torture, including physical abuse, the recording of videos, and electric shocks.
12. Additionally, the petitioner informed that those involved in the arrests were reported to have exerted undue influence on the legal process. They allegedly pressured lawyers, attended hearings to sway judges, and coerced the families of the accused to sever ties. Another critical issue raised was the lack of proper forensic examinations of the accused's devices, which could potentially exonerate them. Furthermore, according to the petitioner no action has been taken against the initiator of the blasphemous content or the entrapper.
13. The testimony also highlighted a procedural issue: investigations were not conducted at the required level, as specified under Section 156-A of the Code of Criminal Procedure (CrPC), which mandates that complaints under Section 295-C be investigated by an officer of at least the rank of Superintendent.
14. It was noted that most of the accused individuals were from low socio-economic backgrounds and had limited education. Many were unaware of the Prevention of Electronic Crimes Act (PECA) and Cybercrime laws, and financial constraints hindered their ability to access adequate legal representation.
15. During the discussion, the lawyer present recounted the pressures that the legal fraternity face when defending



persons accused of blasphemy. He informed that since taking up the defense of these cases, he had faced severe discrimination impacting his career and wellbeing.

16. The representative from the Special Branch expressed deep concerns about the handling of these cases and informed them that they have compiled a detailed report outlining the procedural shortcomings and potential rights violations involved in the blasphemy issue. The report of the Special Branch underscores the gravity of the situation and the need for immediate attention and action from relevant authorities. The findings of this report have since been highlighted in the media, drawing significant public attention. This report was provided to NCHR within a complaint (SB Report, as provided by complainant, is attached at Annexure E)
17. Representatives from the Ministry of Human Rights highlighted the impact that the issue could have for Pakistan which is now going towards its treaty body reviews.
18. When questioned about procedures for registration of complaints, and investigation processes, the representative of FIA Cyber Crime informed that FIA was following the law diligently and they were using high quality equipment for the forensic analysis of phones through which the accused were being charged. He informed the Commission that he would look into the issue and get back to the Commission with additional details.
19. In conclusion, the allegations, statements and reports received by the Commission point to an alarming similarity in the details of the arrests. These also point towards potential manipulation or misuse of blasphemy laws by certain private groups. In light of the exponential rise in the number of cases, and the relatively young profile of the accused, there is a pressing need for impartial and thorough investigations into these cases to ensure justice and prevent the misuse of blasphemy laws. (list of prisoners added as Annexure F)
20. After hearing all the parties present and perusal of complaints and investigation reports, the Commission recommends that a Joint Investigation Team (JIT) to be constituted by the Ministry of Human Rights. The proposed JIT may include high-ranking officials from the following entities:

1. Special Branch
2. Intelligence Bureau

3. Ministry of Law and Justice
4. Ministry of Interior
5. FIA
6. Any other relevant departments.

The Terms of Reference (TORs) for this committee may include the following:

- a) Conduct an objective and impartial assessment into the reason behind the exponential rise in blasphemy cases ensuring that adherence to legal procedures has been upheld by investigating agencies.
- a. Investigate the motives and actions of private entities involved in the entrapment and exploitation of individuals accused of blasphemy.
- b. Probe into the alleged connivance of relevant government officials with private persons in handling blasphemy cases.
- c. Develop and implement a media awareness campaign to sensitize the public about issues leading to blasphemy allegations.
- d. Assess and recommend reforms, if necessary, to improve the procedures followed by the FIA in handling blasphemy cases.
- e. Provide petitioners and families of accused with the opportunity to present their grievances and evidence before the JIT, ensuring fair and transparent proceedings.
